It was half past nine one hot evening in July 1977. The passengers on a plane flying into New York's Kennedy Airport were enjoying the sight of Manhattan below them. Suddenly the city disappeared. The sea of lights turned into darkness.

At the same time subways and elevators stopped, street lights and traffic lights went out. Water pumps failed and left kitchens, bathrooms and toilets without water.

The blackout lasted for 25 terrible hours. During that time almost nothing worked in New York except telephones and transistor radios. Buses and cars moved as long as they had gas. Cabs charged five times the normal fare. Banks, offices, factories, and most stores remained closed. Water became a luxury and air-conditioning a happy memory.

But in the ghettos, looting and burning started. Ten minutes after the lights went out, the city's poor were already breaking into stores. All in all, storeowners lost about a billion dollars during the blackout.
