The patient's waiting, too.

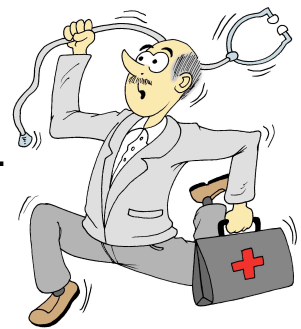
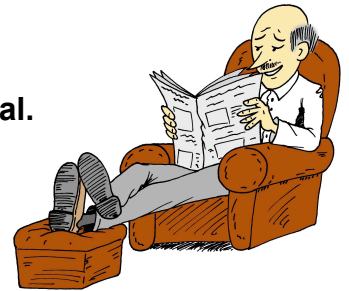
The doctor's coming to the hospital.

SIMPLE PRESENT	PRESENT CONTINUOUS (PROGRESSIVE)
The doctor reads his newspaper.	<i>The doctor's reading his newspaper.</i>
The nurse waits for the doctor.	
The patient waits, too.	
The nurse calls the doctor.	
The doctor comes to the hospital.	
The patient sleeps.	
The doctor begins his work.	

Make the sentences negative:

LONG FORM: The doctor is at the hospital. ... *The doctor is not at the hospital.*

SHORT FORM*: The doctor's at the hospital. ... *The*

LONG FORM: They are waiting for the doctor.

SHORT FORM: They're waiting for the doctor.

LONG FORM: I am very angry

SHORT FORM: I'm very angry.

LONG FORM: You are late.

SHORT FORM: You're late.

*The SHORT FORM is also called CONTRACTED FORM.
